There are 12.3 million adults and children in forced and bonded labor and forced prostitution around the world.

Human trafficking became a crime in the United States in 2000 with the passage of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act (TVPA), and in 2005 in California with the passage of the CA TVPA.

Human trafficking of women, men, and children occurs throughout the world—in other countries, in the U.S., in San Francisco.

Human trafficking is one of the fastest growing and most profitable criminal activities in the world, along with the drug and guns trade.

TRAFFICKING HAS OCCURRED?

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

A person who has been trafficked may:

- · Show signs that their movement is controlled
- · Have false identity or travel documents
- · Not know their home or work address
- Have no access to their earnings
- · Be unable to negotiate working conditions
- Work excessively long hours over long periods
- · Have limited or no social interaction
- Think that they are bonded by debt
- Have limited contact with their families or with people outside of their immediate environment
